Persistence Pays Off

Recently, college persistence has become a focus. BCF is ahead of the curve.

ver the last 50 years, many programs have emerged in the United State to help first-generation and low-income students gain admission to four-year colleges. While college access has increased for these students, challenges arise when they matriculate. Some are not able to navigate the academic, social and cultural challenges they encounter, resulting in a dropout rate that is five times higher than the overall dropout rate. According to a study by the Pell Institute, just 11 percent of low-income students who are the first in their family to attend college graduate in six years.

In recent years, this reality has been acknowledged and is slowly being addressed. New findings have revealed that putting resources into helping these students reach college is just part of the equation. In order to increase college graduation rates—and as a result, the odds for first-generation college students to achieve post-college success and maximize lifetime earnings—creating programs that

help them stay in college and graduate are equally critical. College persistence and

graduation is the focus of the Berkeley Community Fund (BCF). Not only does BCF provide each scholar with a \$4,000 annual scholarship (widely considered the gap between the typical financial aid package and the true cost of a year of college), it also supports its scholars in other ways. For example, a key component is the mentoring program. Each scholar is matched for all four years of college with a dedicated adult mentor who helps them navigate the college experience.

In addition, BCF provides other resources to help scholars thrive in college and graduate:

- Scholars receive support from our College Success Coordinator to help them overcome challenges.
- Scholars are provided with peer support through a community of scholars and alumni.
- Scholars are connected to internships and career opportunities.
- BCF provides summer workshops on financial aid, budgeting, course selection, and career exploration.
 We are encouraged and grati-

fied by the recent attention paid to the importance of focusing on college persistence. This validates our commitment to focus our resources on achieving this specific outcome for more of Berkeley's youth.



The Power of Mentoring

Mentoring can change a life. And who knows? It just may be your own.

ast year, when Juan Azuara, a Berkeley Community Fund (BCF) High Hopes Scholar, told his mom that he was thinking of transferring from San Francisco State to a community college and then on, hopefully, to UC Berkeley, she was hesitant.

"In her mind, I was going backwards," says Juan. "But then I talked to Kit about it, and he was encouraging, because he knew I had a bigger goal in mind—UC Berkeley. He told me 'follow your intuition and your dreams. It's a risk, but there is a great reward, and you need to do what feels best for you.

"That was really meaningful

"That was really meaningful to me, to have someone back me up when making such a big decision."

And the decision paid off. Today, Juan, who graduated from Berkeley High in 2012, is finishing up his first semester at UC Berkeley, majoring in economics. He's also considering applying for business school.

Kit Ratcliff is Juan's BCF mentor. Kit is one of more than 90 mentors, each paired with a High Hopes Scholar currently attending a four-year university. While each mentor and mentee communicates on a regular basis, each relationship is unique, as students have different needs, communication styles and time availability.

Juan and his family moved to United States when he was nine years old, from Mexico. At Berkeley High, even though he was an English Language Learner, he graduated with a 3.6 GPA and played varsity soccer. Juan, who says he would like to be a mentor



someday, in a way already is
— he volunteers as a tutor at
METAS, a program in San Pablo
that tutors K-12 Latino students
in STEM subjects.

Juan and Kit have developed a tight bond. They see each other every month, and talk weekly. At the beginning, as they were developing the relationship, they talked a great deal about school. Now they talk about everything. Kit has met Juan's family, and Juan is a familiar presence in Kit's household. Sometimes they get together for a big outing, such as to the San Francisco Symphony

("very relaxing" Juan reports), other times they grab a cup of frozen yogurt and sit outside and talk for a couple hours. "When I applied for the BCF scholarship, to be honest, I was mainly thinking about the funding," says Juan. "I didn't know what to expect from the mentor relationship. I knew

it was supposed to help me somehow get through college, but I wasn't sure how exactly. It's been great — Kit tries to understand my world just like I try to understand his. That's the beauty of the relationship, we learn from each other."

Kit says the mentoring experience is just as meaningful for him. "I get out of it as much as Juan does," he says. "The older you get, you realize it's not about you, it's about somebody else. If you can enable them to have a better experience or learn something new, you feel good."
