Coming "Full Circle"—BCS Scholars Give Back to the BCS Community

scholars has been fortunate to see a number of our alumni return to the program to provide networking, service, and friendship to our current and alumni scholars.

Alumni Create the BCS Alumni Association—The Alumni Association was es-

tablished by a group of BCS scholars in 2018 to create a space for alumni to support current and recently graduated scholars. The Association is led by the Alumni Council, Eric Jung (2011), Paola Alonso (2013), Cuca Gonzalez (2012), Colleen Sparks (2013), and Fatima Rodriguez-Ortiz (2010). Since its inception, the group has organized a fundraiser at Spats in Berkeley, raising nearly \$3,000 to support our programs, hosted annual picnics to welcome recent college graduates, hosted game nights for current scholars and alumni, and organized a "Clothing Closet" to provide professional clothing for scholars and alumni to use as they enter the early chapters of their career.

Earlier this year, the Alumni Council hosted a pilot workshop series for BCS upper-classmen and alumni. They brought in professionals to offer guidance on resume and cover letter writing, networking, personal branding, and interviewing skills. The Council is now brainstorming ways in

which they can further support our scholars and recent college graduates in what will be a challenging job market. We are excited about the opportunity to grow this vibrant and energetic group.

Two BCS Alumnae also joined the BCS Staff upon completing their degree. Colleen Sparks (2013 BCS Scholar) joined the BCS staff as an intern and currently works as the Program and Marketing Assistant while pursuing her graduate degree. Fatima Rodriguez-Ortiz (2010 BCS Scholar) is one of the Community College Success Advisors. Other alumni support BCS as volunteers or contractors assisting on key program elements. Most recently, for example, Pamela Rodriguez-Ortiz (2015 BCS Scholar) worked on video production projects to help tell the BCS story. It is great to have our very own

his summer when Asha Bvrd learned she would have to take her economics exam through ProctorU, an at-home test monitoring service, she was worried. Due to remote learning, this new method of test taking was implemented in her class. She knew that disruptions, noises from the test environment, or even looking away from the exam on her screen could lead to failure. Learning from home, in a small one bedroom apartment with her family and sharing a room with her sister, how would she be able to prevent this scenario?

Because of Asha's drive and ability to tap into the BCS support systems, solutions came quickly. "I reached out to Lynn [Walker, College Success Manager] at BCS, and she made me feel like I was her priority," Asha says. "I feel extremely fortunate that I was allowed



to use the BCS office space to take my exam. Lynn gave me the resources I needed to take the exam and helped me feel important."

Fast forward to this fall. Asha is in her third year at UC Santa Cruz and settled into her major, Business Management

Economics. She now lives in a quiet studio apartment with two foster kittens. "Having my own space has made a world of difference in my ability to focus and perform at my very best academically," says Asha.

BCS also connected Asha to a paid internship this summer

at SEP, a private equity firm. "I found out about the opportunity through my BCS College Advisor and one of the BCS mentors, Stephanie McKown. It was an extremely new experience for me, and I learned so much about time management, organizational skills, and communication," she says. During her senior year at Berkeley High, Asha was discouraged from taking math. Today, she is loving her math-heavy major, Business Management Economics with a minor in Statistics. She loves the rigor of her major and the ability to apply concrete evidence to solving problems. Asha's talent and readiness to jump on opportunities will take her far.

Today instead of worrying about her housing, her exams, and her future goals, she is now a finalist in a competitive internship with First Republic. We can't wait to see what she will do next!

This sparked his interest in youth development and advising. After graduation, Terrance served in the Peace Corps as an English teacher in Indonesia. For two years he lived in Pace, a village on the East Java Island, where he provided workshops, English clubs, and led a library project that provided books varying from science, history, and literature—from U.S. schools. Terrance also helped his students apply for scholar-

ships and encouraged their dreams of a college education. His support paid off, for several of his students successfully enrolled in college. This experience strengthened his desire to pursue a career in academic advising.

Terrance believes advisors "can impart indelible lessons, influence decisions and behaviors, while sparking imagination." He aims to ensure that the college journey ends in success for all the scholars he supports in BCS' community college program.

Emergency Fund & Finish Line Fund

As the triple pandemic of COVID-19, the

economic shutdown, and a reckoning with racism unfolded this year, our scholars faced even more immediate and urgent obstacles that threatened to derail their education. Many scholars and their parents lost jobs and faced the prospect of not being able to pay for rent, utilities, and education costs. BCS moved quickly to create an Emergency Fund to support students in need, and has granted over \$25,000 to our scholars, providing a lifeline to cover these expenses.

BCS is also helping student success through our Finish Line Fund, created in 2015, to help scholars who need more time to complete their degree and have exhausted their original scholarship grant. The fund gives scholars the ability to enroll in missing required classes. It also gives students the opportunity to participate in a program or class that would enhance their preparedness for a job or graduate school add a major or minor, or take summer classes. A few students have used it to travel to a foreign country to broaden their skillset and perspective.
